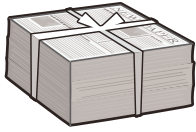


Recyclables Collected in the Community

Please separate the papers by type and tie them up firmly with string in a cross-shape knot before disposing of them.



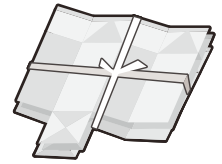

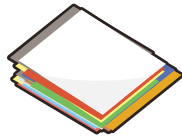

What kind of paper is considered garbage? Paper items besides cardboard, newspapers, magazines, and cartons that can be recycled



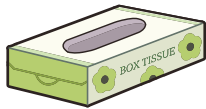
Paper waste

Please put small pieces of paper in paper bags or wrap them in larger pieces of paper before disposing of them.

Paper that's larger than the size of a business card can be disposed of as a recyclable item.



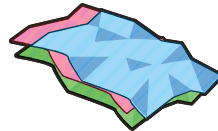
Paper waste in a paper bag

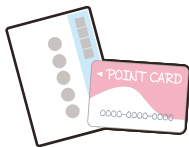

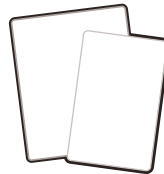

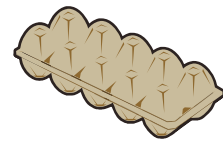
Business cards and cards (made of paper)

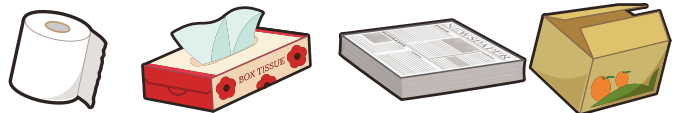


Backing paper inserted into clothes and tights

Paper cartons that are silver inside



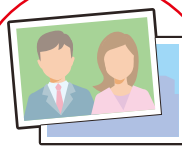
Strongly scented paper (Detergent and incense boxes)

Waxed paper (Paper cups)

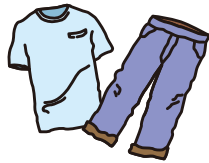
Recyclables Collected in the Community (Paper and Magazines)

Recyclables that couldn't be disposed of on the collection day can be brought to any of the four designated collection centers in the city. (See p. 15 for details)

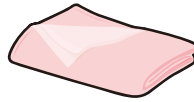
Please tie them up firmly with string in a cross-shape knot or put them in a bag before disposing of them.



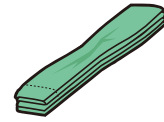

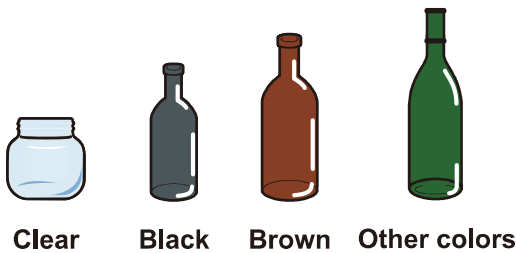

Disposal method and cautions

- Cloth that is dirty, damaged, or wet cannot be recycled and should be disposed of as burnable garbage.
- Futons, floor cushions, stuffed animals, and rugs are not recyclable items. For more information, refer to the Sorting Category Table on p. 17-23.

Glass bottles and jars

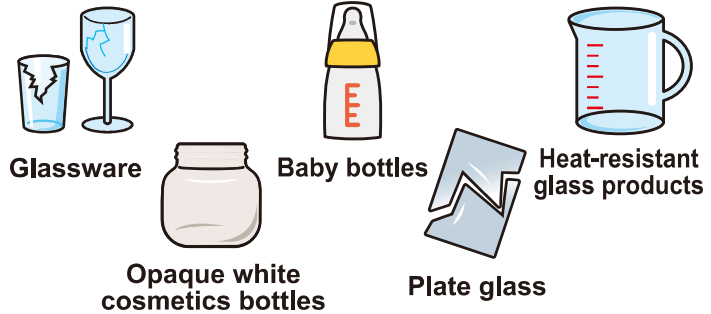
Sort the glass items by color (clear, black, brown, and other) and put them in the designated boxes.

Items that cannot be disposed of as glass bottles or jars (Examples)



*These are different from glass bottles and jars and cannot be recycled.

Disposal method and cautions

- Use up the content and rinse them lightly.
- Be sure to remove the lids and rinse them. Metal ones should be disposed of as empty cans and metals, and plastic ones should be disposed of as plastic containers and packaging.
- Please wrap broken glass bottles in sturdy paper, write what's inside on the paper, and dispose of them as non-burnable garbage.

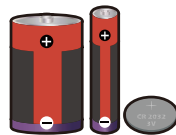

CR, BR	SR, LR, PR



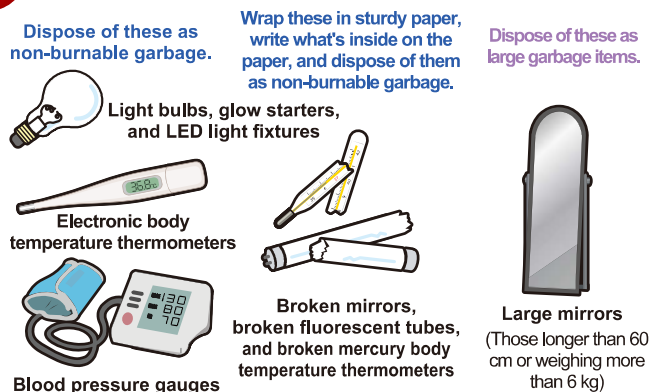

Disposal method and cautions

- Long fluorescent tubes are very dangerous if they break, so please put them back in their original packaging when you dispose of them.
- To dispose of rechargeable batteries (Ni-Cd, NiMH, Lithium-ion, etc.), please consult the store you bought them from.
- Put button batteries in a button battery collection can at any participating collection location (electronics stores, home improvement centers, etc.).
